

EDUCATION, WAGES, AND EMPLOYMENT IN MISSOURI

The link between education and earnings is clear. At each increased level of educational attainment, there is a significant increase in average wage. At its basic level, obtaining a high school diploma or its equivalency increases a workers average annual wagein Missouri by two-thirds, when compared to those without a high school degree or equivalence. Those attaining a Bachelor's degree or higher, on average, earn almost twice as much than those with a high school degree.

Earnings and Unemployment Rates by Educational Attainment, 2015



Note: Data are for persons age 25 and over. Earnings are for full-time wage and salary workers.



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Not only does a higher educational attainment level lead to higher wages, but it also increases employment opportunities. At each increasing level of educational attainment, unemployment rates steadily decline. In fact, those with less than a high school diploma are unemployed at a rate nearly three times higher than those with a Bachelor's degree or higher. At every step, increasing educational attainment not only leads to a higer annual wage potential, but also increases the likelihood that people find a career in their chosen field.

Educational attainment rates for the Kansas City Region workforce are above that of the rest of Missouri for those that completed a bachelor's or advanced degree. In the Kansas City Region, 88 percent of the workforce has a high school diploma or equivalent, and 25 percent has a bachelor's or advanced degree. By comparison, the Missouri workforce has an 88 percent rate with a high school diploma or equivalent and has 23 percent with a bachelor's or advanced degree. The graph below shows a breakdown of the Kansas City Region by county.
